## Greetings from the Rev. Kate Ekrem



Dear Friends,

Hello! I can't tell you how delighted I am to have been invited to serve you, for the next three years, as your Priest-in-Charge. I'm excited about the ministry God has given us to do together. Although I know you've had some stormy times of late (and we'll talk more about that), I was drawn to Redeemer because of your commitment to children in the life of the parish, to mission that really connects you to the people you serve, and to deepening your relationship with the God who loves us.

Your vestry and I have been working on drawing up a Covenant of Ministry for these three years. The Covenant spells out several specific goals, but it seems to me they are all more or less summed up by the first two, which are:

- 1) Coming to terms with the history of the congregation and its relationships with previous clergy.
- 2) Discovering the congregation's special identity, what it dreams of being and doing.

In other words, my role with you is two-fold: both to help be part of the healing that needs to happen after the broken relationships of the past, and to help the parish as a community of faith live into what you all dream, hope, and need it to be.

To do that, I plan to start out with just a lot of listening. You all know Redeemer much better than I do. I hope you'll tell me what you think I should know and what you think we all need to work on (or play with, or take a break from). My goal for the first several months is just to get to know you. I also want to get to know and be a support to the wonderful staff Redeemer already has: Sabeth, Ted, Cheryl, and Emma. I also plan to listen to and learn about where healing needs to happen and help facilitate that healing. If you have anything you think I need to hear, please don't hesitate to give me a call or stop by the office for a chat.

I've been asked to tell you a little about myself. I've been Rector of Grace Church in Norwood for almost seven years. I've loved my time there and I'm going to miss the folks at Grace very much! During that time I also served a term as Dean of the Neponset Valley Deanery, where I had the opportunity to be part of the pastoral response to parishes experiencing conflict. Before coming to Massachusetts, I was the assistant rector at St. Barnabas Church in Irvington, New York. I went to General Seminary in New York City and was ordained in the Diocese of New York.

Before seminary, I spent six years in New York as an editor in book publishing, where I met my husband Dave. He then went into the internet side of publishing and now is the web manager of Mass General Hospital for Children. Our first son, Peter, who is almost 10 and going into 5<sup>th</sup> grade, was born when I was in seminary. Tom,

now 7 and going into 2<sup>nd</sup> grade, was born while I was working at St. Barnabas and Lucy, age 3, is our only Norwood native. As a family we love doing anything outdoors and this time of year if we're not working in the vegetable garden we're probably out hiking.

I am really looking forward to finally putting names to faces with many of you, and learning new names and faces as well. I hope to meet some of you at the Home Eucharist on July 29, and more of you at my first Sunday, August 2. I'll be in the office as of August 3, so feel free to stop by and say hello!

### Mission Trip to El Hogar Cancelled

On June 30<sup>th</sup> the leaders of the 2009 mission trip to El Hogar made the decision to cancel the trip. A military coup d'etat in Honduras on June 28 removed President Manuel Zelaya from office. All countries in the Americas have condemned this action. Within Honduras social unrest mounted as demonstrations, for and against Zelaya, filled streets in the capital. The US State Department issued a travel alert advising US citizens to defer all non-essential travel to Honduras; and advising US citizens inside the country to refrain from travel.

This change of plans is a deep disappointment to all of us who have been preparing for the trip. We had anticipated a return to a place of great beauty, industry, and hope, and to be with our dear friends at the Agricultural School and all the wonderful boys. El Hogar is a very special place in our hearts and in our parish life. We had looked forward to stepping back into a place that welcomes and embraces us; where we could reestablish our connections with the staff and teachers who give more than we can offer.

As a parish we have grown together with this relationship. A few dozen parishioners have gone to El Hogar; several members of our community sponsor children at the schools; and many are very generous with their material support. The cancellation of this year's trip is only a momentary change in the way we live into this ministry. We will keep connections with the boys and staff as we sustain our connections and plan for the future.

Our brothers and sisters in Honduras, our dear friends at El Hogar, the children and young men and all of their families, remain a part of our community. Now more than ever they need our support and prayers. Please keep them all in your thoughts - for their safety and their peace.



## Vestry Update

Hello from the Vestry! We want to let you know what we've been up to, for those of you who haven't had the opportunity to read through our meeting minutes.

The most exciting news is that on May 1 we had the opportunity to meet the Priest-in-Charge candidate, The Rev. Kate Ekrem. Shortly after our meeting, we voted unanimously to accept her as our new Priest-in-Charge, and are looking forward to having her join us on August 2nd.

Although other news is not quite as exciting, we have been working hard. We have established several new committees:

- **2008 Audit Committee** to review parish financial records from 2008
- **Communications Committee** to help establish consistent and helpful communications practices and policies at Redeemer
- **Nursery Committee** to ensure helpful and safe practices and policies in our Sunday nursery and with the caregivers of our youngest parishioners

We approved a new facilities rental policy which will help determine consistent practices, including rental fees for groups inside and outside the parish. A new rental contract form is currently under discussion as well.

The vestry was pleased to approve up to \$1,750 from the Youth Ministries Fund for the remaining expenses related to the J2A Pilgrimage in July and praised the group for raising close to \$6,400 on their own, thereby significantly reducing the amount needed from existing church funds.

Our Treasurer, Dinesh Dulipsingh wants to let you know that you should have recently received your 2009 pledge statements from January through May 09 by mail. Please take this opportunity to review your pledge state-

ment and please help support the parish and our financial team by keeping your pledges up to date over the summer. A copy of our mid-year financial report was included with this mailing. Stay tuned for more detailed financial news in the next issue of *Redeeming Features*.

As a reminder, vestry meetings are open to all members of the parish. The vestry meets at 7:30pm on the first Wednesday of every month and usually also on the third Wednesday. Vestry minutes are posted on Redeemer's website under the "Documents" link: [www.our-redeemer.net/community\\_docs.htm](http://www.our-redeemer.net/community_docs.htm). Paper copies are also in the clear plastic paper trays just outside the church office.

## Liturgical Changes This Summer

You may notice some changes in our worship this summer, as we try two different patterns of worship at the 9:30am service. We (Cheryl, Ted, and Sabeth) are trying to keep our summer worship a little shorter, easy to participate in for those who don't come as often or who may be visiting, and upbeat. We split the summer into two units: June through mid-July & mid-July through August.



In the first half of the summer, we have returned to a liturgy that is traditional *Book of Common Prayer*. We are saying the Nicene Creed and the Confession of Sin, and are using Form III of the Prayers of the People with the addition of an invitation to add prayers of thanksgiving. We are singing the Peruvian Gloria, a call and response version, and using the Celtic Alleluia for our Gospel Acclamation each week. We're using Eucharistic Prayer B.

Starting July 19, we will switch a few things up for the second worship unit. Overall, the structure of the service will stay the same, though we will be using more contemporary language. We will sing the same song as a Call to Worship each week—a musical invitation to enter into worship that becomes familiar. Instead of singing the same Gloria, we will sing a different hymn of praise each week. We will continue to say the Nicene Creed and the Confession, and we will use Form IV of the Prayers of the People. Our Eucharistic Prayer (and other prayers) will be from *Enriching Our Worship*, a supplementary liturgical source from the Episcopal Church. We will also sing the Lord's Prayer in contemporary language.

One other change in our worship this summer is the re-appearance of Morning Prayer as our Sunday worship on June 14 and

July 5. For many years in the Episcopal Church, Morning Prayer was the primary Sunday service with Holy Eucharist being offered monthly. In the 1970's the church moved toward focusing around Eucharist as a focal point of weekly worship, and Morning Prayer gradually faded from practice. Morning Prayer is a wonderful service of praise to God for creation, for the gift of a new day, for the opportunity to praise and worship God with our whole lives and being. In Sunday Morning Prayer we sing or say beautiful canticles that we don't use most of the rest of the time. On a purely logistical level, Morning Prayer may be led by a lay person or deacon, which means that Sabeth can take a Sunday morning off (owing many thanks to Ted!).

As mentioned at the beginning, we are trying some new and different things in worship this summer. If you have feedback (any likes or dislikes) please share your thoughts with Sabeth, Ted, or Cheryl so we have some points of reference for future worship. Come worship with us!



***Animal, Vegetable, Miracle***  
by Barbara Kingsolver

An amusing and inspiring account of one family’s year living “back to the land.” Kingsolver is a great storyteller and the delicious recipes are an extra bonus.

### Sabeth’s Picks

***Absolution by Murder*** by Peter Tremayne

This is the first book in the Sister Fidelma series of mysteries. Sister Fidelma is a religieuse in the Celtic Church in seventh century Ireland, sister to a king, and an advocate at the highest level of law. Set mostly in Ireland, tidbits of church history and theology weave throughout – making it an edifying read as well.

***The Omnivore’s Dilemma: A Natural History of Four Meals*** by Michael Pollan

Pollan follows four meals from source to table. It’s a fascinating look at different food chains – industrial food, organic or alternative food, and food we forage ourselves. You will not look at your dinner decisions the same way after reading this book.

***Traveling Mercies*** by Anne Lamott

Lamott’s quirky and humorous look at life and faith is authentic and refreshing.

### Kate’s Picks

***Peace Like a River*** by Leif Enger

A lovely novel about a boy growing up on the Great Plains whose family is shaken by crisis. Exceptionally well written and one of the best novels I’ve read in a while.

***The Desert Mothers: Spiritual Practices from the Women of the Wilderness*** by Mary C. Earle

One of the things I studied during my sabbatical last year were these wise women (and men) of the first century who retreated into the wilderness to be closer to God. When we’re feeling frenetic with balancing work, parenting, volunteering, and so many other things, the desert mothers’ focus on simplicity, stillness, and solitude – just resting in the love of God – can be like water in the desert.




