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Greetings from Rev. Kate Ekrem

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Dear friends,

Each of the coming Sundays, we will begin our worship with lighting the Advent wreath and praying together some prayers that are more than 1,500 years old. They are usually called the O Antiphons, because each one begins with an O. Whenever I hear these antiphons I get butterflies in my stomach, the kind you get when you are a little kid and you know Christmas is getting close. Advent means coming and we are in the season of waiting for the coming of Christ. The themes of Advent – anticipation, preparation, watching and waiting and getting ready – are reflected in all we are probably already doing to get ready for the holiday season. When the Christmas songs start playing in the stores, there is really a sense of expectation in the air. We may remember all those Christmases when we were children, waiting with eager anticipation for the special morning when we got to open all our presents under the tree. But as adults we know we're not just waiting for presents, we're waiting for Jesus, for God with us, and it's good to recapture that sense of eager expectation and longing -- longing for God to come close to us and fill our hearts with love.

The O Antiphons reflect that sense of anticipation and longing. They may be familiar to you because they are the verses of the hymn "O Come O Come Emmanuel." We'll be saying one or two of them each week as we light the Advent wreath.

The O Antiphons were probably written by an anonymous monk, around the year 500. Traditionally they are part of Evening Prayer every day from December 17 through December 24. The antiphons are like a prayer version of an Advent calendar. They count down the days to Christmas. Each one does two things. It gives Jesus a special name or title, and it also asks Jesus to come and fulfill a prophesy from the Old Testament about the Messiah.

The names the Antiphons give Jesus give a real picture of who he is and what we hope for from him. He is God's holy Word, he is Wisdom, he is our Lord and Savior, he is a radiant dawn, like light shining on us, he is King of all the nations, and most of all he is Emmanuel, God with us.

But the prophesy part always touches me more because of the ways the antiphon puts it with that "come." Come, show us the way to salvation, come, stretch out your hand and set us free, come break down the walls for those who live in sickness and death, come Lord. It's a prayer to God, but it's also demanding and insistent. Come on, God, don't you know we need you know? Come, help us find the way to peace, come, heal the sick and feed the hungry, come, come help us take care of our loved ones, heal us, help us.

This is really our Christmas wish list, isn't it? Not a new toy under the tree, but for God to come and do these things, break down the walls, stretch out his hand, set us free. Because we are not just waiting for a baby to be born on Christmas Day, we're waiting for Jesus Christ to come again, a second time, to fix this broken world and all our broken hearts. We can see signs that God is on the way when we see these prophesies from the O Antiphons being fulfilled – captives being freed, the sick being healed, the love of God being shared.

The O Antiphons were originally written in Latin, and apparently by a very clever monk all those centuries ago, because in Latin they form an acrostic. Taken backwards, the first letter of each of the titles for Jesus makes the Latin words *Ero Cras*, which means, Tomorrow, I will come.

The O Antiphons

Dec 17: O Emmanuel, king and lawgiver, desire of the nations, Savior of all people, come and set us free, Lord our God.

Dec 18: O Wisdom, O holy Word of God, you govern all creation with your strong yet tender care. Come and show your people the way to salvation.

Dec 19: O sacred Lord of ancient Israel, who showed yourself to Moses in the burning bush, who gave him the holy law on Sinai mountain: come, stretch out your mighty hand to set us free.

Dec 20: O Flower of Jesse's stem, you have been raised up as a sign for all peoples; kings stand silent in your presence; the nations bow down in worship before you. Come, let nothing keep you from coming to our aid.

Dec 21: O Key of David, O royal Power of Israel controlling at your will the gate of Heaven: Come, break down the prison walls of death for those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death; and lead your captive people into freedom.

Dec 22: O Radiant Dawn, splendor of eternal light, sun of justice: come, shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death.

Dec 23: O King of all the nations, the only joy of every human heart; O Keystone of the mighty arch of man, come and save the creature you fashioned from the dust

Parish Breakfast and Advent Wreath Making

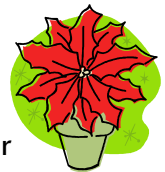

This advent season we welcome Dr. Diane D'Souza, who will lead our Adult Formation series, entitled "**Civil Rights and the Modern Yankee Martyr Jonathan Daniels**". This series begins Sunday, December 8th (Advent II).

This three part forum turns the spotlight on one of the saints and martyrs of the Episcopal Church: the New Hampshire native Jonathan Daniels (1939-1965). The compelling story of his life and his growth into a passionate advocate of equal rights in church and society offers us a special window into inspiration and the promptings of the Spirit, martyrdom and the holy. We also gain insight into the Civil Rights movement and the Church, and the unfinished work of dismantling racism and building beloved community today. The forum is a facilitated learning experience in which we make use of film and lecture, reflection and discussion.

> **Dec. 8: Moved by the Spirit: the Magnificat & the call of Martin Luther King, Jr.**

What is inspiration? What causes us to step outside our comfort zone? This session introduces New Hampshire native Jonathan Daniels, and explores the promptings which led him to leave his life as a Cambridge seminarian to join the Civil Rights struggle in Georgia.

> **Dec. 15: Martyrdom and the Arc Towards Justice**

What does it mean to be a martyr? Where do we find martyrs in our faith today? Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. noted that the arc of history bends toward justice. How do we see the arc of faith? And why might the American South be our Holy Land?

> **Dec. 22: Trayvon Martin, Voting Rights, and Our Unfinished Work**

Jonathan Daniels felt compelled by his faith to go to Georgia, and to work to bring about justice for all people. Where might the pull of the Spirit lead him today? Where is it leading us? This session highlights the annual Jonathan Daniels and All Martyrs' pilgrimage, and explores new movements for change in church and society.

***Diane D'Souza, Ph.D.** is the director of Lifelong Learning at Episcopal Divinity School (EDS) and the Director of the Mission Institute, a collaborative project of EDS, Episcopal City Mission, and the Diocese. Diane spent nearly twenty years in mission and multi-faith work including as a faculty member and director of an international center for research, interfaith relations, and reconciliation in Hyderabad, India.*

News from the Diocese: Bishop Shaw retiring in September. New Bishop to be elected in April.

Bishop M. Thomas Shaw, SSJE announced today to the Diocesan Convention his plans to retire at the time of his successor's consecration on Sept. 13, 2014.

Shaw in January 2013 called for the election of a bishop coadjutor to serve alongside him for a period of time prior to his retirement, but he has since decided that the overlap period will be unnecessary, and that the transfer of episcopal authority will take place at the bishop-elect's consecration ceremony.

Shaw made the announcement during an afternoon presentation to the Diocesan Convention that focused on his gratitude for the community life of the diocese and for diocesan ministries initiated during his nearly 20-year tenure that have not only accomplished much but which have also made his own life of faith grow, he said.

He recalled, with good humor, his own experience of the coadjutor period when he became a bishop, and how, at the time, he wondered: "What is this coadjutor stuff for? I'm not doing this when it's time for me to retire." He then proceeded to completely forget all about that resolution that until just a few weeks ago, he said, when his prayer about the upcoming election brought it back to mind.

He said he is looking forward to having the next 10 months to continue offering his gratitude to the people and congregations of the diocese. "Then the new time can begin that God is preparing us all for. Let's give the future the most open arms we possibly can," he said.

In an interview prior to the convention, Shaw said: "Some might think this decision has to do with my health, but it doesn't actually," he said, referring to the brain cancer diagnosis and subsequent treatment regimen he's been undergoing over the past six months. "My decision really has to do with my understanding of the episcopate and with God's love."

The election of the new bishop is scheduled to take place April 5, 2014, at the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston.

A "Season of Service and Celebration" is being planned to honor Shaw in April-June 2014, beginning with Episcopal City Mission's State House Lobby Day on April 9 as the kick-off service event, and concluding with a picnic and celebration at Franklin Park in Boston on June 21. In between, all congregations are being invited to honor Shaw by organizing or participating in a community service event of their choosing.

Shaw has requested that any financial gifts made in his honor be designated for the diocese's Barbara C. Harris Camp and Conference Center. Information on how to contribute will be made available early in 2014.



Music News

Upcoming in December ...As usual, there are many music happenings in December at Redeemer!

In observance of Advent, our worship service revisits the ancient practice sung liturgy. Like last year, we will sing the psalm each week, and this year we institute the practice of a sung Lord's prayer, in addition. Not to worry - the chant tune is familiar to many Episcopalians, and the choir, as always, will provide leadership.

Our choir is busily preparing its annual **Advent Candlelight Lessons & Carols Service for Sunday December 8, at 4:00**, with a guest string quartet, and reception to follow. Thanks to the adjunct singers from within and beyond Redeemer who have already committed to joining us. Singers are still welcomed to join us for this special service, and may pick up packets of music from the door of Room 208. There are also youtube practice links to each piece, which Bernadette can email to you. Adjunct singers should plan to attend the second half of regular Wednesday rehearsals from 8:00-9:00 p.m. each week. Dress rehearsal with the strings is Wed., Dec. 4th, and a choir-only dress rehearsal Saturday morning Dec. 7th 9:00-11:00 a.m.

On **Sunday morning December 22nd**, when our liturgy honors Mary and we celebrate the Magnificat, the Atrium Singers will sing two songs in Mary's honor - "Ave Maria" and "Canticle of Mary."

On **Christmas Eve December 24th**, we welcome guest singers into our choir, and we anticipate guest instrumentalists from Cambridge's *The Renaissonics* on recorder, keyboard, and other period instruments to join us for the 8:00 service.

Looking ahead to 2014 ...

From January 9th to February 1st, I will be traveling on a Continuing Education and Mission trip to South Africa, where I will be rehearsing and singing on tour with *Village Harmony*-a group of singers from the US, England, and Canada, in collaboration with the *Polokwane Singers* from Polokwane, South Africa. A second purpose of my trip will be to explore mission, and music-mission, partnership possibilities for parishes in the MA diocese, in various locations throughout South Africa. As a result of my work this past spring and fall with the MA diocese on behalf of South African children for the Music-and-Mission event in October, I was able to arrange for the touring group to sing a concert on January 29th at *The Cathedral Church of St. George the Martyr in Capetown*, former seat of Archbishop Desmond Tutu. That concert will be a sister "launch event" to the Dedham October 25th evening, this one on the "other side of the pond," to highlight new mission collaborations between Massachusetts and South Africa. The touring group will also sing a benefit concert on January 27th at the *Rondebosch United Church* in Capetown to benefit the Masazane soup kitchen, which serves meals to 150 children daily, and is supported by the Arlington-based organization *Tremendous Hearts*. I would like to take this opportunity to express my deep and heartfelt thanks to all at Redeemer who have supported my efforts and work with music and mission in South Africa thus far.

While I am away, the music program will be in good hands. Substituting on January 12th will be organist Geoffrey Wieting. My interim predecessor Joyce Painter Rice returns to direct the choir rehearsals and lead services on January 19th and 26th. I will be back on the organ bench Sunday February 2nd.

But for millions of poor Americans who rely on food stamps, reductions that began this month present awful choices. One gallon of milk for the kids instead of two. No fresh broccoli for dinner or snacks to take to school. Weeks of grits and margarine for breakfast.

And for many, it will mean turning to a food pantry or a soup kitchen by the middle of the month.... The reduction in benefits has affected more than 47 million people.... It is the largest wholesale cut in the program since Congress passed the first Food Stamps Act in 1964 and touches about one in every seven Americans." The Grow Clinic, <http://www.bmc.org/pediatrics-growclinic.htm> , is located at Boston Medical Center and it serves families who have a baby or toddler who has been diagnosed with FTT (failure to thrive). This is a very serious medical condition that occurs when a child does not receive adequate nutrition due to complex social and economic factors. Redeemer has had a relationship with the Grow Clinic for over seven years and this is the fifth year we have been invited to help with the Holiday Party.
