

Holy Eucharist, Rite II Palm Sunday – April 2, 2023 9:30 AM

All are warmly invited to participate in worship in whatever way is safest and best for them – at home or in person. Following are our current Regathering Guidelines. These guidelines are set by our Regathering Committee in consultation with the Vestry. Please feel free to reach out with questions or concerns.

Masking is optional with the following three exceptions:

- Singing (research consistently shows that singing is a "superspreader" activity)
- 2. In the masked/distanced section of the church (right/Memorial Garden side)
- 3. For children coming forward at the eucharist (as we crowd tightly together)

Please be aware that the indoor portion of this service will be live-streamed. Both audio and video will be recorded. If you prefer not to be on video, please sit in the area of the church under the balcony.

When we begin the liturgy of Palm Sunday, we step over the threshold into Holy Week, the most significant week of the Christian year. Through the liturgies of this week, we seek to enter into the last week of Jesus' life: his triumphal entry into Jerusalem, his last meal with his disciples, his Passion, death, and resurrection. We do more than simply remember these events—we ask God to make these events powerfully, mysteriously present to us in our worship that we may be transformed by them.

We are glad that you are with us for this Palm Sunday service, and we hope that you will continue the journey through all the services of Holy Week at Our Redeemer.

Presider: Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the Lord:

People: Peace in heaven and glory in the highest.

Presider: Let us pray.

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ

our Lord. Amen.

Blessing of the Palms

Please hold up your palms to be blessed.

Presider: The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Presider: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. People: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

Presider: It is right to praise you, Almighty God, for the acts of love by which

you have redeemed us through your Son Jesus Christ our Lord. On this day he entered the holy city of Jerusalem in triumph, and was proclaimed as King of kings by those who spread their garments and branches of palm along his way. Let these branches be for us signs of his victory, and grant that we who bear them in his name may ever hail him as our King, and follow him in the way that leads to eternal life; who lives and reigns in glory with you and the Holy Spirit,

now and for ever. Amen.

Presider: Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

People: Hosanna in the highest!

Following the cross and torches, the people process around the lawn and into the church, waving palm branches, and singing the hymn.



The procession continues into the church and the people find their seats and remain standing.

Presider: The Lord be with you.


People: And also with you.

Reader: A reading from the letter to the Philippians.

Holy Gospel Matthew 21:1-11

Gospeller: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew.

People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.

When Jesus and his disciples had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

Presider: Lift up your hearts.


People: We lift them to the Lord.

The Presider then prays that all may receive the benefits of Christ's work and the renewal of the Holy Spirit.






Presider: Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us.

The Holy Communion

All who come seeking God are welcome to receive communion. If you have difficulty coming forward, please tell a greeter that you would like communion brought to your seat. To come forward for communion, please exit your pew by the side aisle and return to your seat by the center aisle. If you would like a gluten-free wafer, please let the communion minister know. You may receive wine at the center aisle, but we also affirm the long tradition of the church that to receive the bread alone is to fully receive the grace of the sacrament.

Intinction (dipping the wafer in the wine) is not permitted. Though it might seem counterintuitive, studies have shown that intinction is actually more likely to spread infection than sipping from the cup.

If you do not wish to receive communion, we invite you to come forward for a blessing. To indicate your desire for a blessing, simply cross your arms over your chest when you step forward.


If you are worshiping at home and not able to come to church for Communion, you are invited to pray this prayer:

Prayer for Spiritual Communion





- Easter Sunday at 9:30 AM, followed by an Easter Egg Hunt.



Our parish regularly uses all the liturgical resources approved by the Episcopal Church for Sunday services including The Book of Common Prayer (1979) as well as Enriching Our Worship (1997) and additional resources as they are permitted. Over the course of the year, we use both traditional and contemporary language and imagery for God and God's People, all of it grounded in Scripture and the Anglican tradition.
